ADMISSION.

Candidates for admission to the Freshman Class will be examined in the part of the Course of Study gone over in the Preparatory Department.

Candidates for a higher standing will be examined in the part of the Course of Study in College gone over by the class to which they may desire admission.

The stated times for examinations are Tuesday preceding Commencement, and the first day of the following Term.

No student will be permitted to rise to a higher class, or to obtain a degree, who has not sustained himself creditably on examination.

Students will be received at any time during the Session; but after entering, no deduction will be made for absence, except in cases of protracted Sickness.

EXAMINATIONS

Of all the Classes, the last week in January, and immediately preceding Commencement, except the final examination of the Senior Class, which will commence on the fourth Wednesday in May.

A record will be kept by the Faculty of the scholarship and deportment of every student. Information concerning his proficiency and deportment will, when required, be communicated to the parent or guardian.

LECTURES.

On Natural Philosophy and Chemistry, with experimental illustrations, before the Junior Class.

On Mineralogy, Geology and Physiology, with exhibitions of specimens, models, drawings, &c., before the Junior and Senior Classes.

On International Law, Political Economy, Evidences of Christianity, Natural and Revealed Religion, and Elocution, before the Senior Class.

LIBRARY, APPARATUS AND CABINET.

The College Library—which is receiving constant additions by purchase and donation—already comprises upwards of one thousand volumes.

The Department of Natural Philosophy is already supplied with a fine selection of choice Apparatus, from the extensive establishment of Chamberlain & Ritchie, Boston.

In the Department of Chemistry and Natural Science, orders have been sent to the manufacturers for an ample supply of Apparatus, which will be in readiness for the ensuing session.

The Cabinet of Mineralogical and Geological specimens comprises a very valuable collection, made by a gentleman of eminent practical qualifications.

PUBLIC PERFORMANCES.

On the day preceding Commencement public addresses will be delivered before Societies connected with the College by gentlemen invited from abroad.

VACATIONS.

1. One week (from December 24th to January 2d.)

2. From Commencement to the first Monday in September.

Such students as are obliged by their circumstances to teach school, are allowed to be absent for the purpose.

Unexcused absence from recitation, or from the county, without permission of the President, will subject the delinquent to reduction in his Department Column.

SESSIONS.

The scholastic year is divided into two terms.

1. From the first Monday in September to the last Friday in January.

2. From Monday after the last Friday in January to Commencement.

DEGREES.

1. Degrees shall be conferred only at Commencement, and by the authority of the Board of Trustees.

2. Students who have completed the regular course of study, and passed their final examination, shall, if approved by the Faculty, be presented to the Board of Trustees at Commencement, as candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Arts. Should a quorum of the Board not be present, the Faculty may confer the degree.

Certificates will be given to irregular students for such part of the course of study as they may have completed.

EXPENSES.

Tuition, in the College class, per term,	\$15 00

Contingent fee, per term,	50

The amount of each term bill must be paid in advance to the Treasurer, whose certificate will be required before the student will be admitted to recitation.

Board may be obtained from \$1 75 to \$2 50 per week.

There are some expenses resulting from taxes voluntarily imposed by the Societies.

In incidental expenses, if the student is supplied with money, he is exposed to extravagant and immoral habits. To guard against this, it is suggested to parents to deposit funds with some one approved by the Faculty, who, for a trifling charge, will give particular attention to the pecuniary affairs of the student, and render an account at the close of each term.

It is earnestly recommended to all parents and guardians not to authorize the obtaining of credit, and not to pay debts unauthorized.



REMARKS.

All the Books within the Course may be obtained in the Book Stores in Liberty.

There is already in existence one Literary Society of high character, and another will be instituted as soon as deemed necessary.

Instruction will be given in the Hebrew and German languages, if desired, for which an extra charge of \$10 each, per term, will be made.

It is confidently believed that Society in Liberty, in point of intelligence, sobriety and general morality, is unsurpassed. The city authorities—sustained by a very large majority of citizens—refuse license to those fountains tending to the corruption of public morals.

The Board of Trustees design filling the chair of Chemistry and Natural Science at the next regular meeting. The friends and patrons of the institution may therefore be assured that this important department will be fully organized and in operation for the ensuing session.

In the Preparatory Department a competent Tutor will be provided for the next session.

WILLIAM JEWELL COLLEGE.

Is a spacious edifice, situated in the city of Liberty, Clay county, Missouri, four miles north of Independence, on the Missouri river. A daily line of stages connects Independence and Liberty is connected by Telegraph with St. Joseph on the west, and with all the eastern and southern cities.
