Credits

Credits are in semester hours.

The credit value of each course is indicated along with the course description on pages that follow.

The maximum number of hours which may be earned during the 8-weeks session is nine hours.

Facilities

Dormitory rooms are available for both men and women. Each student will provide and care for his own linen. Board may be obtained in the College cafeteria at reasonable prices. The Snack Bar will be open for breakfast and lunch each day, except Saturday and Sunday.

Recreational Facilities

The Brown Gymnasium, with swimming pool, and nearby tennis courts, will be open during the Summer Session.

The College Union lounge (air conditioned), and the College Book Store will also be open.

In nearby Excelsior Springs (14 miles northeast) and Kansas City (14 miles southwest) there are unlimited facilities for recreation and entertainment, including the Starlight Theatre, American League baseball, parks, golf courses.

Admission Requirements

Persons who have graduated from an accredited high school with not less than 15 units, exclusive of physical education, will be considered for admission.

For students who have not completed high school work, other evidence of qualification to do academic work on the college level will be considered by the Admissions Committee. Individual consideration will be given to veterans.

Students transferring from other colleges are required to present an official transcript of credits and a statement of honorable dismissal.

Graduation Requirements

For complete requirements for graduation, see the William Jewell College catalog, available on request from the Director of Admissions.

Graduation exercises will be held at the end of the session for candidates who have completed the requirements for the degree of Bachelor of Arts. The program is scheduled for the evening of Friday, July 29, 8 o'clock.

Teachers' Certificates

Teachers' certificates are issued by the Superintendent of Public Instruction at Jefferson City upon receipt of the student's college record, which the Registrar will send at the student's request.

William Jewell College offers a Bachelor of Arts degree with a major in 21 fields, including Elementary Education. Courses required for certification in both Elementary and Secondary Education are available in the Summer Session.

Counseling and Placement Services

The College maintains an effective Department of Guidance, designed to enable each student to secure assistance in realizing the greatest possible benefit from all educational, social, and spiritual experiences.

The Placement Service assists all members of the William Jewell family in locating employment in many fields, business and professional, and has been especially successful in placing qualified teachers.

Courses of Instruction

The college may at its option exclude from the program those courses which have less than six registrants.

All courses meet Monday through Friday unless otherwise designated.
