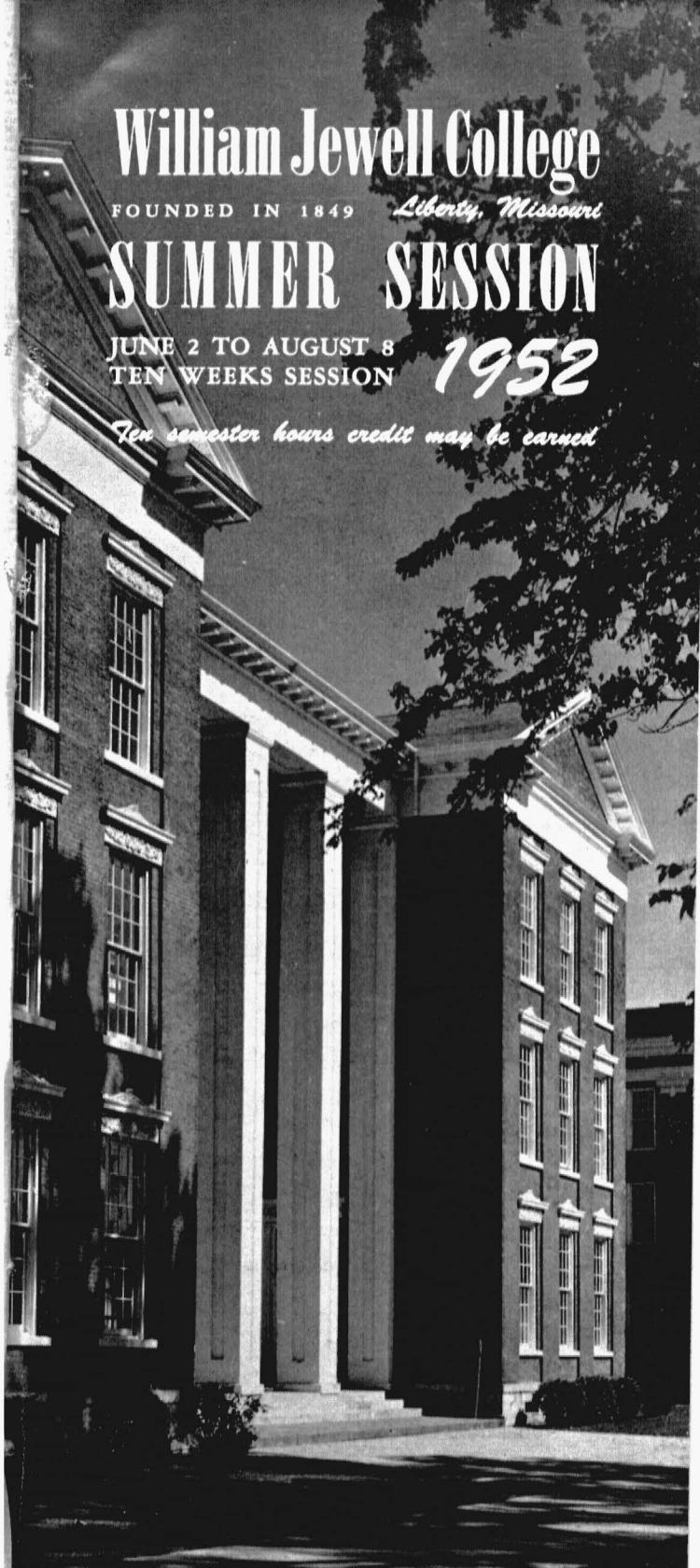

The Campus of Achievement

Founded in 1849, and known nationally as "The Campus of Achievement," William Jewell acquired this sub-title because of the high percentage of its graduates who have attained eminence and success in positions of responsibility and leadership. It is a Liberal Arts four year coeducational college with the highest academic standing. The location of its 106-acre campus with its fireproof buildings in historic Liberty, Mo., fourteen miles from Kansas City, gives students the cultural advantages of both a small town and a large city.

Admission Requirements

Graduates of an accredited high school with not less than 15 units exclusive of physical education will be admitted without condition if they rank in the upper half of their class. For students who have not finished their high school work, other evidence of qualification to do college work will be considered by the Admissions Committee. Individual consideration is given to veterans.

Students coming from another college must present transcript of credits and statement of honorable dismissal.

Admission Arrangements

Application should be made upon blanks secured from the Dean of Students, William Jewell College.

Graduation Requirements

Commencement is held at the end of the session for candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Arts. (See College catalog for requirements.)

Tuition and Other Expense

Ten semester hours may be earned during the 10 week session.

The tuition for the ten weeks session is \$105. For less than 6 semester hours credit the cost is \$18 per semester hour.

The Snack-Bar will be open for the convenience of students.

Who Should Attend Summer School

The courses offered have been chosen with three groups of students in mind.

1. The student already in college who wishes to accelerate his program.
2. The high school graduate or other qualified student who wishes to enter upon his college work at once without the loss of any time, and to accomplish as much as possible before military duty may intervene.
3. The secondary or elementary teacher who wishes further work for certificate requirements or as credit for a degree. William Jewell offers an A.B. degree with a major in secondary or elementary education.

Recreation

The gymnasium, swimming pool, tennis and volleyball courts will be open for the summer. Opportunity for golf will be available.
